

In his latest book, Ton Lemaire moves between astonishment, admiration and outrage. In forty essays he presents a modern and recalcitrant view of the future of our world, overshadowed as it is by countless threats. Only a radical shift in our thinking and behaviour can provide a way out of the problems our celebrated 'progress' has caused. Lemaire advocates a break with capitalism, in which our pursuit of constant growth and riches has become pathological and in the near future will increasingly lead to greater inequality, and ultimately to the destruction of the planet.

With an outlook shaped by anthropology and philosophy, Lemaire examines many different aspects of our culture and society, including economics and ecology, religion and the quest for meaning. He writes about the shortcomings of democracy, the danger of perfectionism, the bio-industry, deforestation and our longing for the wilderness, and points to a law of nature that means all things are continually in flux.



TON LEMAIRE is an anthropologist and philosopher. His *Philosophy of the Landscape* appeared in 1970 and he has published many books since, including *On the Wings of the Soul, The Fall of Prometheus, Among Animals* and *With a Light Footfall.* In October 2021 he was awarded the Groeneveld Prize for his contribution to the debate about nature and landscape in the Netherlands,

MARJAN SLOB THE EMPTY SKY

A SHORT PHILOSOPHY OF LONELINESS



The word 'loneliness' is doing the rounds. Worried policymakers are taking steps to 'combat' loneliness among isolated elderly people and gaming youth. The concept itself, however, is little researched. In her new book, Marjan Slob presents 'loneliness' as the unpleasant feeling you get when experiencing an absence of interconnectedness. But loneliness is also a power. When you're lonely you suffer from what isn't there, which shows that you are capable of self-reflection and imagination. Slob makes this idea easy to grasp with the help of ideas from major thinkers including Blaise Pascal, Daniel Dennett and Simone de Beauvoir, but also from novels, films and pop songs. She playfully explores loneliness through phenomena like stage fright, masks, selfies, space travel, and primping and preening in the ladies toilets – with David Bowie as a guide who knows how you can play with your inescapable sense of being lost.



EDWIN WINKELS MESSI'S TEARS



Suddenly, in the summer of 2021, the news broke that Lionel Messi would have to leave Barcelona FC after twenty-one years. Deep in financial trouble, Barça had no money left to pay the biggest star in its history. At an emotional press conference, the inconsolable Messi took tearful leave of the club where he developed into the best footballer in the world.

They were far from the only tears shed by the celebrated footballer in his impressive career. But what do we actually know about Messi's ups and downs? Writer, journalist, expert on Spain and Messi fan Edwin Winkels sought out well-known and less well-known details about Messi's childhood in Rosario, his loneliness in Barcelona, a broken leg, a remarkable puppy love, the long shadow of Maradona, Messi's injuries and most remarkable goals and much more besides.

Winkels alternates chronologically between tears of joy and tears of pain, creating a wonderful short biography of the man who has broken almost every single footballing record.

AALTJE VAN ZWEDEN WHERE IS HOME?

CARING FOR FORGOTTEN GROUPS IN SOCIETY



As Aaltje van Zweden looks out of her window in Amsterdam one morning, a thought suddenly occurs to her: what if you were in danger and nobody did anything? She's never wondered about that before. Aaltje doesn't fully understand why such a thought has struck her so forcefully and decides to investigate. It turns out that during the Second World War, a Jewish family was taken from the house where she is currently living, deported and murdered. As the mother of a child with autism and learning difficulties, the next question quickly arises: what exactly happened to children like hers during the war? Aaltje makes increasingly shocking discoveries and meanwhile the world is brought to a halt by the pandemic. She sees at close hand that when a society comes under pressure, vulnerable people are the first to suffer.



AALTJE VAN ZWEDEN is an author and the wife of conductor Jaap van Zweden, with whom she has four children. Her son Benjamin's diagnosis in 1996 inspired her to set up the Papageno Foundation, which supports families with children who have autism through music therapy. In 2015 she opened the first Papageno House, which provides supervised accommodation and work experience for young adults with the condition. A year later, Aaltje was awarded the prestigious Helene de Montigny Prize for her efforts in helping people with autism. In 2017 she published the bestselling A Blessing in Disguise, and in 2021 The Power of Music.

The once indestructible group is irrevocably confronted with its own shortcomings. They're in their mid-thirties and busy with... Well, with what exactly? A blind striving for success? What does that actually involve, being successful? Does it equate to a prestigious job as a correspondent in the United States? A warm, harmonious family? Or is it more a matter of helping others in their own search for success? And if you're so busy doing all that, how much space is left for friendship?



MUSTANG SALLY'S HAND



A fateful accident in the late 1970s changes the life of the De Ridder family completely. On the dike in front of their farmhouse, a truck hits six-year-old Abel, killing him. The loss devastates the young family. In their efforts to pick themselves up again, mother Louise and father Rijk drift apart and begin to neglect their nine-year-old daughter Janna. The family doctor suggests a possible straw to clutch at, something that might help ease the unbearable pain: another child.

Kjeld is born a year later, their 'comfort child' as a neighbour's daughter, Naomi, will later call him. Naomi lives with her strict Reformed Church parents further along the dike. She tries with Kjeld's help to escape her suffocating environment. For Stan, too, the driver of the truck, who lives on the other side of the dike, life was changed profoundly by the accident. In the hope of a measure of forgiveness, he seeks contact with the De Ridders.



EVA POSTHUMA DE BOER writes novels, cookery books and columns. Her novels include *Endless Days*, *Lichthart*, *The Comedy Club*, *Ica* and *And the Miracle* is You. As a columnist she has written for *Het Parool* and since 2018 for *de Volkskrant*

EASTBOUND



It's 1952. Heindert, a twelve-year-old boy, is unaware of his mother's past, unaware that, during the war, she had a love affair with a German Wehrmacht soldier, who is his father. Due to people's animosity, Heindert and his mother move from village to village constantly. Heindert copes by creating his own world, which revolves around dreams and pictures – that is until mother and son find themselves in real trouble. They leave everything behind and flee to an unknown destination, crossing the German border. During the journey, Heindert slowly discovers the hidden truth about his background.

Eastbound is a fresh and impressive novel that offers an insight into the tragedy of a young mother persecuted for having had an affair with a German soldier. When the war ends, the Dutch villagers shave her head, humiliate her, and concentrate all their frustration and anger on her and her son. The impact on the two of them is revealed to the reader in meticulous, beautifully articulated observations that steer clear of cliches and black-and-white thinking. The accessible tone and the use of Heindert's own childhood viewpoint nicely counterbalance the weightiness of the subject.



JOLANDA IVONNE CLÉMENT studied marketing, communication and journalism and has since worked mainly for socially committed organizations. Her great passion is creative writing, in which she incorporates her interest in history, philosophy and nature. Her second novel, *Pleasant Valley*, will be published this summer.



As she is going into labour, Tak leaves and meets the downstairs neighbour, who encourages him to tell his life story. What follows is a wonderful and compelling tale about Tak's life. Starting with his childhood during the Great Depression he goes on to talk about his mother's death, the Second World War, his relationships and his now estranged daughter Marina. What will the morning bring?



Herman Kruijssen fights for the German army during the First World War. After the Armistice he is not able to return to the Netherlands, and instead wanders through Europe for years and makes his way down south to Spain. On a rainy day in 1929 he collapses under a tree and is found there by Vicente Urias, who takes him to his country estate and makes him part of the family. A close friendship develops between them, and Herman becomes one with the land and the people. Then the Spanish Civil War breaks out and Herman is forced to choose sides. Traumas from the past resurface. In the chaos of the Civil War, Herman's finds love and not much later fathers a son, Levi.

Will Herman manage to stay true to his own moral compass in this turbulent period, in a country he has come to love, and to protect his wife, his child and everyone dear to him?

Land of Echoes is an all-encompassing novel that explores friendship, family, passion and impossible love, a deeply human story about good and evil, and about summoning courage and perseverance in times of turmoil.


