HOW A COLD CASE DETECTIVE IDENTIFIES UNIDENTIFIED BODIES

It is a well-known image: the white box on a dusty shelf, forgotten in the archive, in which the forensic investigator finds all the missing evidence. Case solved. But how do these things really work? Carina van Leeuwen, a forensic detective with the Amsterdam Police Cold Case Team, works on unsolved serious cases involving murder, manslaughter or sexual assault on a daily basis. In *Unknown But Not Forgotten* she relates how she identifies an unidentified body. Journalist Sybilla Claus tells the story of the professionals with whom the investigators work. She interviews leading specialists dealing with DNA, fingerprints and facial reconstructions. In *Unknown But Not Forgotten* Sybilla Claus and Carina van Leeuwen introduce the reader to the fascinating world of forensic science.







SYBILLA CLAUS is an anthropologist, political analyst and journalist with the daily newspaper *Trouw*. Before, she worked for the *De Telegraaf* newspaper, as bus driver and as a self-defence teacher. Claus has written several books, including one on Zimbabwe.

CARINA VAN LEEUWEN has been working as a forensic detective for the Amsterdam Police Cold Case Team since 2006. Because of her long experience stretching back many years, she has become the figurehead for cold cases in the Dutch Police Force. She also publishes thrillers.

ALDO HOUTERMAN WE ARE OUR BODIES



We attach more importance to our bodies than ever. We've never exercised as much as we do today and we watch what we eat closely. And yet at the same time, our bodies are less and less useful: robotization and artificial intelligence are making us redundant in the workplace. In *We Are Our Bodies* philosopher Aldo Houterman places the significance of our body in the current age. He counters the thesis of neurobiologist Dick Swaab (author of *We Are Our Brains*) that human beings are no more than their brain. Houterman demonstrates that the relationship between us humans and the world around us does not consist of our thoughts, but of our movements and corporality. It is the body that forms the basis of intelligent human behaviour. Using well-known examples from sports, as well as psychology, philosophy, literature and art, Houterman shows that the body is capable of reacting to a situation without the involvement of conscious thought.







JACQUES MEERMAN MEDITERRANEO



A CULINARY TRAVEL GUIDE TO THE MIDDLE AGES

This book offers a unique view of the origins of modern cuisine. Following in the footsteps of four twelfth-century travellers – a French monk, a Jewish rabbi, an Islamic secretary from Granada, and a Moroccan geographer – the author shows how different cultures have influenced one another's culinary traditions and how they fit within the political, social and religious structures of that time. The result is a family portrait of cuisines that differ greatly from one another and yet are inextricably linked.

Mediterraneo is the first book that has ventured to join the dots between the European, Byzantine, Middle Eastern and North African culinary cultures, offering a broad historical view of world cuisine. The book features dozens of authentic recipes.

He has also written a large number of articles about traditional Spanish cuisine and a book about the influence of Islamic cooking in Europe. The Netherlands is ranked among the top five happiest countries in the world and the average Dutch person grades his life a 7,8 on a scale of 10. Perhaps the Dutch lifestyle concept of 'niksen' (doing nothing), which received a lot of attention in the American press, is related to this feeling of happiness: the art of doing nothing has a stress-reducing effect. 'Gezelligheid' is still one of the first Dutch words tourists learn to pronounce, and it is inextricably linked to Dutch culture. The Dutch have the time and money to enjoy life, and this is exactly what they do. With their carpe diem mentality the Dutch move from beer garden to restaurant, from music festival to foodtruck festival. Long before the term 'lifestyle' even came into being, the concept of gezelligheid has been seen as a phenomenon that is an intregal part of Dutch history and culture.



KOEN DE VOS THE CITY OF GENIUS

WHY FLORENCE PRODUCED SO MANY GENIUSES DURING ITS GOLDEN 15TH CENTURY



What the 17th century meant for Amsterdam, the 15th century meant for Florence. Over a period that lasted less than one hundred years, artists and thinkers such as Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo, Machiavelli, Raphael, Botticelli, Brunelleschi, Fra Angelico and Lorenzo de' Medici have gained the city its reputation. Their works are treasured throughout the world. These artists and scholars lived on the threshold of the Renaissance, a period that was to herald countless innovations in the visual arts. Where did this unparalled explosion of talent come from and how can it be explained? How could a small city with a population of barely 60,000 produce so many geniuses within less than one hundred years? KOEN DE VOS studied Romanesque Philology in Ghent, Rome and Bologna, focussing on Italian language and literature. He used to give training sessions in creative thinking and supervised creative processes in companies and government institutions in the Netherlands and Belgium. Nowadays, he works as a freelance copywriter. He has previously written Brainstorming, 50,000 ideas a day, which has sold more than 10,000 copies.

JUDITH FANTO VIKTOR

A CAPTIVATING STORY ABOUT THE MEANING OF FAMILY TIES



Vienna, 1914. Viktor, a member of a well-to-do Jewish-Viennese family, is a good-for-nothing bon vivant and a womanizer who – a great sorrow to the intellectual Rosenbaums – doesn't finish any of his many studies. The 1938 Anschluss turns out to be a personal turning point: by showing courage, ingenuity and audacity, Viktor becomes the protector of all those he loves.

Nijmegen, the Netherlands, 1994. The Rosenbaums are having problems with Geertje, the youngest member of the family, who rebels against the fear and shame with which the Rosenbaums regard their Jewish identity.

When will her family finally come 'out of hiding'? And why doesn't anybody ever want to talk about Viktor, her grandfather's brother?

Geertje decides to investigate and comes across an extraordinary family secret.



JUDITH FANTO, who worked as a lawyer for many years, was born in Delft as Geertruide van den Heuvel and has taken her name from her Jewish grandmother Trude. At twenty she changed her first name to Judith. Fanto, the real surname of the Rosenbaums in her novel, is her literary pseudonym. Viktor is based on the story of Judith Fanto's Viennese-Jewish family. Viktor, to whom the book is dedicated, truly existed.

Viktor is a dazzling novel exploring the impact of stifling family trauma on shaping your own identity. Lovingly and with quirky wit, Fanto writes about the influence of someone's name on their destiny, and the subjective significance of truth and lie. In a courageous and authentic manner she dares to ask sensitive questions.



ANNE-GINE GOEMANS HOLY TRIENTJE



Nun Trientje (86) has a divine mission: to rid the world of all nuclear weapons. Inspired by an American nun who occupied the largest nuclear weapons depot in the world, Trientje forms a small international group of like-minded activists. Their goal: to occupy a Dutch nuclear weapons depot. Will the unexperienced group of idealists succeed in their plan to shake up the world? With her refined style and urgent storytelling Goemans shows us what happens when blind ambition and irreparable trauma go hand in hand.

Holy Trientje is a great, expansive novel inspired by true stories. Goemans travelled the world to write this novel. She met Megan Rice (1930) who spent three years in jail for occupying the nuclear complex Y-12, travelled through Fukushima after the nuclear disaster and interviewed the last remaining survivors of the nuclear tests on the Marshall Islands.



ANNE-GINE GOEMANS is a writer and journalist. Goemans made her debut with the critically acclaimed *Ziekzoekers* (*Sick Seekers*), for which she won the Anton Wachter Prize in 2008. *Clijvlucht* (published in English as *Cliding Flight*), her second, highly praised novel, won Goemans the Dioraphte Youth Literature Prize in 2012 and the German M-Pionier Prize for literary newcomers. In 2015, her major literary breakthrough, *Honolulu King*, was published, with more than 50,000 copies sold. Movie rights have been sold.


HERMAN KOCH FINNISH DAYS

NEW NOVEL BY HERMAN KOCH, INTERNATION-ALLY BESTSELLING AUTHOR OF THE DINNER



At events or dinner parties, people often ask Herman Koch about his 'Finnish period' - with a note of pity. He tries to laugh it off, mostly due to the implausibility of his experiences. A tall, awkward nineteen-year-old boy choosing to leave home and find work in an extremely remote part of Finland. It may sound romantic, but reality was quite different. His mother had passed away shortly before and Herman went to Finland to get away from his father and his father's new girlfriend, and to put off something he had known for a long time.

Forty years later Koch is back in Finland, where he stumbles upon a poetry book that explicitly refers to his earlier stay. He can no longer pass this period off with a laugh. He puts his own past under the microscope, examines how memories work and how to relay this story without misrepresenting the facts.



HERMAN KOCH is an internationally bestselling author. In 2009 he wrote The Dinner, which was translated into 42 languages and acquired world fame. During subsequent years, bestsellers such as Summer House with Swimming Pool (2011), Dear Mr M. (2014) and The Ditch (2016) were published. In Finnish Days Koch returns to his youth, which also inspired his debut novel Save Us, Maria Montanelli (1989).

Finnish Days is a probing novel about grief, coming of age, and about what we should put into words and what's better left unsaid.

Leie Blum, a three-year-old Jewish girl, is taken in by a Dutch Christian farming family during the Second World War, following the deportation of her parents to a concentration camp. Subconsciously, she keeps waiting for them to return, not quite aware of the reason why she always feels out of place, a black-haired girl living with a blonde family of farmers. When she grows up, she eventually marries Dirk and has two sons. In 1974, the woman who took her in and raised her as her own passes away, and at the funeral Leie has a nervous breakdown. She is unable to return to a life with her husband and sons. Leie, her husband and sons, each have their own perspective on their family's sudden falling apart. Depression, family secrets and the need to have a grip on one's own history are all themes in this moving story.



MACHTELD SIEGMANN is a Dutch-language specialist and works as an editor, journalist and copywriter. The Swarm is her first novel.



ROBERT POLLACK THE TASK



Frenchwoman Christine Lavergne and German Steffen Rittershaus, both lawyers for the Council of Europe, have been sent to Russia to investigate the death of a local solicitor in a prison cell. One witness dies, another disappears. During their investigation, Christine and Steffen are confronted with their personal demons. Steffen secretly gets involved in The Task, an underground organisation that aims to uncover government corruption. It is an exciting group of people, but when Steffen's involvement threatens to jeopardise the official mission and tensions rise, he has no choice but to confide in Christine. 
